TIMELY TIPS ON TUNING TOUGHIES XVI - "A VISIT TO THE EDITOPS DESK-Pt.I

Maybe you think this is digressing from the subject. Well, you're right! But we thought you would be a bit interested in how we go about putting "DX News" together each week. Well, to begin with, a page of reports takes your Editor about & hour to type out, while pages of short write-ups, like the above, or our front page, take about 45 minutes each. So you can well imagine, then, the time it takes to do the whole series of pages each week. Now, we generally start on Monday evening, and start with Page IV, if there are a lot of special DX programs for the coming week - too many to get all the write-ups on Page II. If there aren't very many, then we start with Page III. Reports received early in the week, or ones which missed the previous issue by a day or two then appear first, unless some are added in this space below the write-ups for special programs, on Page III. And maybe you have wondered why your report usually heads a page, or is used at the bottom of a sheet. Here is how we choose these - the longer reports go on top, and the shorter ones at the bottom. We try not to carry any report over to the mext page, and when we do, you'll know that your Editor mis-judged the number of lines the bottom report would take. So, leaving shorter reports for the bottoms of pages, we can more easily judge the length of space it will occupy when put onto the stencils for "DX News." After getting used to the size of type used by members, or their hand-writing, it has become easier to ascertain how many of typed lines here will be needed to get it all in. We also try to avoid awkward abbreviations, like "recr" for receiver" and "hrd" for "heard," and so spell them out. However, if we see we're going to have to squeeze, then towards the bottom of the page, these short-cuts may appear. Occasionally we have to cut a word or two then, but only in order to get that report in on that page. Next week we'll attempt to give you a fuller picture of how we set up "DX News," and explain some about the station write-ups, the Special Programs list on Page I, and our short "fills" which sometimes appear at the bottom of a page to occupy the last line or two. It won't help you to log any new stations, but it might be interesting to some. Next week, Part II.

The following veries have been received during the past week: CFBC CJIE CKCK KOVE KSUM WCDT WCNX WFTR WIMA WLMW, and a Holiday greeting card from CMHE. KSUM, heard testing on 11/20, will finally go into full time operation on New Year's Day, with a schedule from 7:00 a.m. to 1:00 a.m., E.S.T., and signals beamed North. Christmas morning turned out to be rather poor at this location due to heavy static and weak signals, so I had to content myself by logging CMCH on 790 Kc/s. from 3:30 to 3:57 a.m., CMAR on 1170 Kc/s. from 4:25 to 4:50 a.m., for a new catch, and WFTR from 5:05 to 4:30 a.m. with an allnight program. A Guatamalan was heard on 1025 kc/s., plus numerous verified Cubans such as CMHE CMHX CMKF, etc. The station mentioning Ecuador on 1050 Kc/s. turned out to be CMKF instead of HC2AJ. Logged WLXW on Christmas afternoon from 1:00 to 1:30 p.m. 12/26 - WMIE on regular schedule from 5:12 to 5:30 p.m., through WRVA. 12/27 - WLAE on regular schedule from 5:50 to 5:58 a.m., 12/28 - WCLT, Newark, Ohio, 1430 Kc/s., on ET from 3:05 to 3:32 a.m., and WABB on regular schedule from 7:00to 7:08 a.m. New Year's morning was rather good here, with the following stations heard: 1/1/49 - Started off easy by logging XEW from 1:38 to 1:57 a.m., WWNF was heard signing off at 2:02 a.r., XERH, 1500 Kc/s., was logged from 2:10 to 2:31 a.m., HJET on 1510 Kc/s. was logged with swell signals from 2:36 to 3:12 a.m., and must have been living up to its name by using JET power judging by the way it rolled in; HJCZ was logged on 1040 Kc/s. from 3:47 to 4:02 a.m. - will try a prepared card on this notorious non-verifier); HJCJ on 1390 Kc/s. from 4:20 to 4:56 a.m., and finally a station on 1000 Kc/s. after CMKW signed off, 5:20 to 6:10 a.m., which seemed to be TIFA. For the first time during a DX season I find myself receiving many more veries than additions to my log. Since my previous report, I got the followings ones: Ideal-type photo and print cards from WWXL and WCDT, respectively, and slightly less attractive poetals from WBCK CKNX and KFBK - swell letter-heads from CHLO KDSH WJEW WIEK, 2 from WKIN, and plainer stationery from WHAV WFAX WINA WCNX and KSUM, as against these new catches: XEAI WLEA and WMAJ and the "re-hearing" of some of the semi-local DX broadcasts. WSJS during their special said the NRC had mistakenly listed them as but a kilowatter instead of a 5 kilowatter. WMOH's special was so hashed by other stations that I could not even cite the title of a single record. 1/2 - I heard a third station end its day of broadcasting at 3:00 a.m., despite WWSW and WATO "bucking" them on 1490 Kc/s. I'm workeningh who it was - as they left that channel, WTMV began a cycle tone. That same morning I held a weak, fady station on 1430 Kc/s. at 3:00 to 4:30, without identifying it - I'm wondering if it was WCLT. (Probably KSIJ, Bern - Ed.)
