Well, here I am writing my first report from St. Lawrence since I came here about a month ago. My Zenith broke down just before I came so I've been using a small table model which gives pretty poor results. A couple of the boys from home came up to visit yesterday and brought the set, repaired, up here. I hadn't been trying much DXing on the other set but wasted no time now that the other one is here. My first DX morning here netted four new ones, thanks to the New England DST. I know there's a few more where these came from. First, WAGM, 1450, Presque Isle, Maine s/on 4:55 with Stars and Stripes. WAGM, Houlton, Maine, comes on at the same time on 1340. That one must wait for another day as I could get only one at a time. WMAS 1450 s/on 5. Have wanted this one for a long time. WHAV, 1490 s/on 5:01 atop frequency. WNIX 1480 s/on 5:02. Now for WDOT to complete the state again. (They s/on at 4:30 now, Ken - Ed.) Reception here in the dormitory with no outside aerial as yet (hope to have a little something soon) is only fair. The building I think has some bad effect on incoming signals. The nearest radio station outside of our campus wired setup KSLU is WSLB in Ogdensburg at 20 miles. It's the best daytime signal on the dial. GENERAL

Some favorable comment on my attempt to help you out on new countries last week has encouraged me to continue this week and whenever there is space available.

The next country in the list is CURACAO, which was reported many times last season via PJ02 (722) Willemstad. Not reported yet this fall, but should be fairly easy with a good crystal. Sign-off is at 2200, but probably best around 1700.

The DOMINICAN REPUBLIC has but one really powerful station, HI3T now on 620 Kcs. Should be strong enough to get into the East and mid-West during the early evening. HI2 is listed with 1 Kw. on 1350, and might be another possibility.

ECUADOR is another tough nut to crack. Most who have it verified have done it via a DX special from HCJB now on 700 Kcs., and the most powerful station in the country. No other station is likely enough to be mentioned.

FALKLAND ISLANDS is probably the toughest in the Western Hemisphere. No one has ever reported hearing the Port Stanley station as yet. It is now on both 600 and 1500 Kcs., but with only 200 watts.

GREENLAND offers a distinct possibility after last year's success on the part of several. Best bet seems to be OXI on 633 Kcs. during the evening or on a holiday eve. WXLS still operates on 850 Kcs. with a scheduled sign-on at 0300 and might be a possibility. It has been verified in the US.

GUADELOUPE is still operating from Basse Terre on 650 Kcs. with a drifting transmitter. It has been frequently logged off frequency. Watch for a French speaking station around 650 Kcs. best around 1800-1900. Goes off at 2000 with La Marseillaise, quite a distinctive tune.

There are several in Guatemala which are regularly heard in the US. For the newcomer to this type of tuning, TGW on 640, often on top in the East and TGJ on 880, also often on top offer the best chances. Try them around 2300. Sign-off is at 2400.

HAITI is not easy without a DX special, but all Haitian stations have been heard all right. Best bet is 4VW on 1315 Kcs., usually good with a good crystal. The new one on 1080 Kcs. 4VA, has also been heard in the evening.

HONDURAS is virtually impossible except with a stroke of luck. HRLP on 610 Kcs. with 1 Kw., is the most powerful, but without a special program, this is just luck.

JAMAICA is quite possible during the evening, or at 0600 sign-on on 720 Kcs. with the Radio Jamaica station at Cross Roads. Montego Bay (1180) same program, has also been reported in the evening.

MARTINIQUE is another rare one with very few if any having logged it. Station is on 1500 Kcs., supposed to sign-on at 0530. Good luck.

MEXICO was fully covered last week. You should have at least 3 reports on their way to Mexico by this time. This is all we have room for this week, but if you think this is of any value, I'll be glad to continue in the same manner. Best plan for logging foreigners if you are now, is to watch the DIGEST and tune for what is being heard. '73.

The Tropospheric really broke loose here on September 16! About half of Nebraska VHF outlets were seen with good, sharp pictures. First logged was KOLN-10 Lincoln 585 miles at 1:05 am sign off. Then came WOW-6 Omaha 660 miles logged at 1:50 and KMPV-3 Omaha logged at 2:04. The stations were first noted around 12:00 and the reception was nice and clear most of the time. I have recently installed a crank-up tower on 16 foot roof of house and with other mast and rotor on top, I am up around 70 feet above ground which I think is quite high. I have a single "Winegard Interceptor" antenna for VHF and 2 bay corner-reflector bowties above rotor. "Interceptor" is definitely the best antenna I have tried yet and I have tried a-plenty of them. Higher antenna definitely helping my DX considerably in almost every direction. I have lots of high trees around here and I wanted to get above them and finally did. Thus DX continues here, but is a "once in awhile affair" as conditions have been generally poor. Now to my DX since last report: 9/16 logged WLTC-4, WLWT-5, WFBN-6, WCPO-9, WKRC-12, WUJ-4. On 9/26 seen WLWD-2, WPTZ-3. Big UHF opening on 9/28 gave me these: WICA-15 with excellent reception, followed by WINT-15 with snow-free reception after WICA sign off around 9:15 PM EST or so. I think the station I was receiving was in Ohio but can't be sure. It was operating somewhere between channel 40 and 44 but due to a out of position dial pointer on my UHF tuner I can't be exact. Log now stands at 76 VHF and 7 UHF. **Veries now total 55.**

During a recent windstorm our stacked Super Davis' were blown down. But the resulting damage was negligible because it landed on the UHF corner reflector. Low Band DX is virtually ruined in the Buffalo area because of two locals operating on 2 and 4 wrecking 2, 3 and 4. 5's chances are lessened by Rochester and Cleveland. 6 will be ruined by a new station opening up in St. Catherine, Ont. Some new ones we got before the antenna blew down are WSAZ-3 IPTZ-3 WLWT-4 WCHS-4 WSLI-10 and WBNS. 73's.

Don Roller, Route #1, Dupont Road, Fort Wayne 8, Indiana:

The Tropospheric really broke loose here on September 16! About half of Nebraska VHF outlets were seen with good, sharp pictures. First logged was KOLN-10 Lincoln 585 miles at 1:05 am sign off. Then came WOW-6 Omaha 660 miles logged at 1:50 and KMTV-3 Omaha logged at 2:04. The stations were first noted around 12:00 and the reception was nice and clear most of the time. Making one or more return visits lately were WCAH-25, WERT-7, WSEV-9 and WDTV-2, but oddly enough, the 16th was the only outstanding day, and consequently-the only day in September that anything new was added save WDTV-2 on the 4th and the new local, WIN-T-15. Well, here it is October, and believe it or not, skip can still be seen here about every few days or so! I can't understand it. This set absolutely ignores the fact that the skip season has been over for some time now! Hi! But there's one trouble: they just flash in and out and they never stay long enough at a time to be identified.
