## SCHEDULE OF EVENTS

### Thursday, August 29th

Registration in the Lobby of the Thunderbird Motel. There will be a fee of \$2.50 for each member registering.

7:45 A.M. Members will assemble for the Colorado Springs tour. The tour will include as many points of interest as possible such as the Air Force Academy, Pikes Peak, and the Garden of the Gods. Noon luncheon will be at the Air Force Academy officer's club. The tour will last until 5:30 P.M.

5:30 P.M. Cars will leave the Balboa for the Dx Monitoring Post at Glen Isle. Both groups will meet at Glen Isle at 7:00 P.M. for the all night session.

7:00 P.M. All night Dx session will begin at Glen Isle with a chicken dinner. This will be a never-to-be-forgotten evening high in the Rockies. A number of receivers and antennas will be available so that everyone will have a chance to DX. Bring along adequate clothing as mountain temperatures may drop close to the freezing mark.

### Friday, August 30th

10:00 A.M. Registrations continue. Dzers return from Glen Isle to prepare for Estes Park trip. Tour of Rocky Mountain National Park will be conducted, leaving from the Balboa at this time. The tour will go through "fabulous" Broomfield Heights, home of dxer Marvin Robbins, and Boulder, home of the National Bureau of Standards (WWV) and Larry Godwin. The tour will then proceed to Estes Park and on to Rocky Mountain National Park. There will be time out to dx from the cars high on Trail Ridge Road. Luncheon will be at Grand Lake. The tour will then wind on through Fraser, Winter Park and then over Berthoud Pass and back to convention headquarters. It is advisable to limit the amount of food as higher altitudes can cause heavy eaters a certain amount of discomfort. The tour should end up at the Balboa by 6:00 P.M.

1:00 P.M. Color slide tour of Latin American Radio Stations shown by Dave Gleason. In meeting room at Thunderbird Motel.

2:30 P.M. Cars leave the Balboa for KXZ-TV Transmitter site high above Denver on Lockout Mountain.

7:00 P.M. Annual Convention Banquet. Holiday Inn, 13800 E. Colfax. Your place at the banquet will be determined by a place-card consisting of the shape of your state with a radio station call letter from your state. This will give you more opportunity to meet more dxers from around America. Instructions for "Call letter bingo" will be given out at start of banquet.

Saturday, August 31st

7:00 P.M. Banquet menu will be swiss steak. Speaker for the evening will be John Beer, Denver frequency monitor. Following the speaker, will be the presentation of awards. The Denver DX Memorial award will be given in honor of Francis Mittler and Howard Wagner. Service to humanity is the best work in life and the Denver NRC members cherish the memory of these devoted men who devoted themselves to the cause of furthering the National Radio Club. The second award given will be the award for the member who has contributed most to the NRC this past year.

Contest awards will be made to the winners of the domestic and foreign contests by Ernie Wesolowski and Bill Mittler. An award will also be made to the dxer traveling the most distance to the convention.

9:00 P.M. The annual business meeting of the National Radio Club will begin. Many important items will be presented during the business meeting that will demand your careful attention. In the absence of the Executive Secretary, Bill Mittler will chair the meeting.

We certainly hope that you enjoy all that has been planned for you and that you will make attendance at NRC conventions an annual affair.

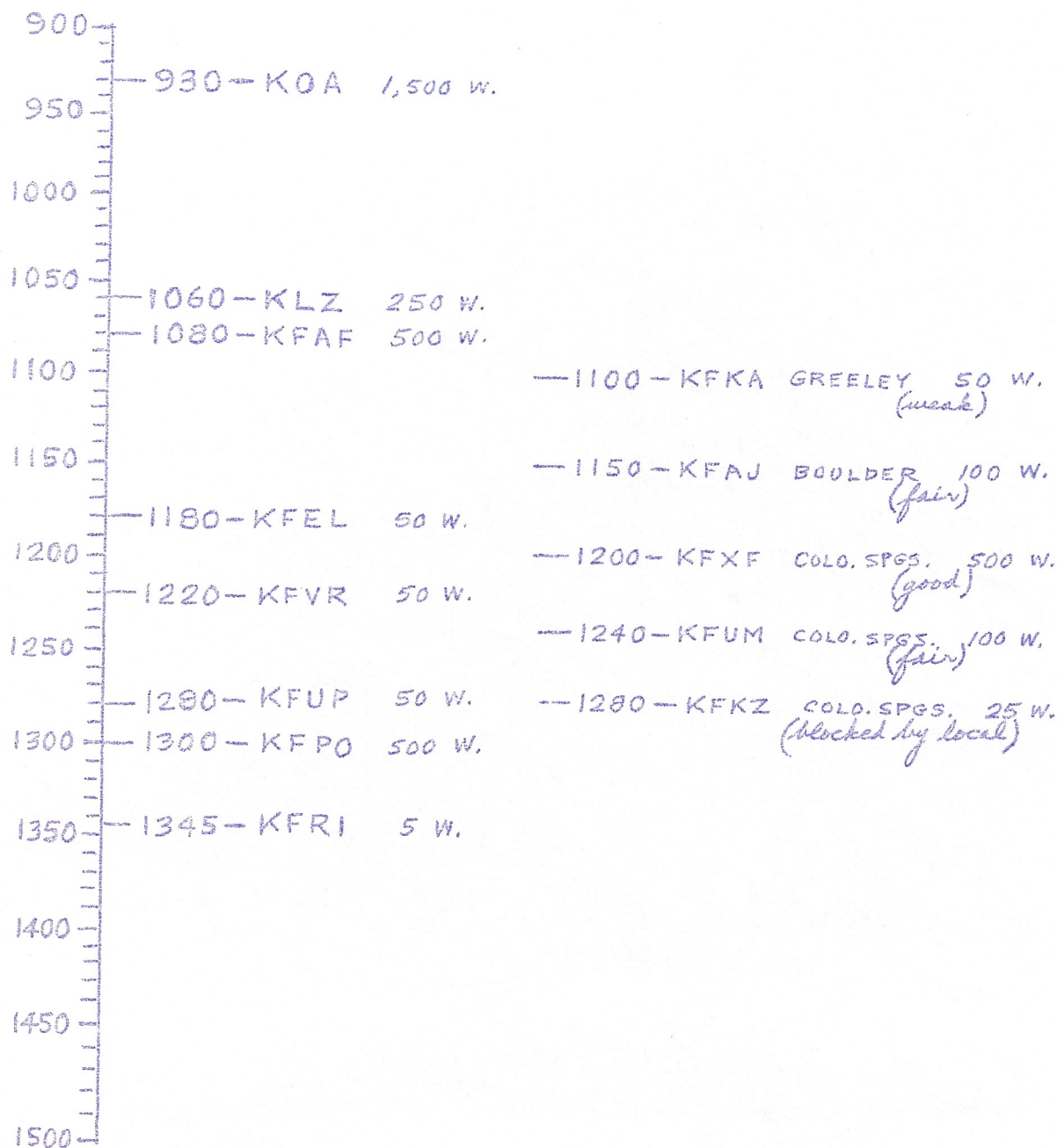
A special table has been provided in the lobby of the Thunderbird Motel for those desiring any brochures on the Rocky Mountain areas.

A PAGE OF DENVER RADIO HISTORY

Just for fun...let's go back a few years. Let your imagination take over at this point, and let's pretend to go back a few decades in time...back let's say, to the fall of 1925.

You are living in a fashionable apartment on Denver's south side, and because you are (like all people) interested in radio DX, your newest 10-tube superhet is turned on. A cousin of yours who lives out on a farm near Limon is visiting and you wish to demonstrate the wonders of radio to him. The following dialogue takes place as you are showing your new airphone to your cousin:

"What type of interesting programs do you think we can hear, Glen?" Let's tune in now and sit back, relax...and we'll just start down here at the low-end of the radio dial.



"Come on in with me...here, have a chair over here next to my airphone and let's see what's going on." Gee, you sure are lucky you live out of town a ways. We have eight radio stations here in Denver and they...well, heck...they block the dial here and it's darn tough to get anything outside of town. The way the Federal Radio Commission is granting licenses these days...I don't know...ther just isn't any room for any more stations! It's a wonder Denver can support ea eight stations!"

"KOA (General Electric Co.) is down here at the low end of the dial around 930 and they sure do come in strong...lucky there are no other stations close to their frequency because they come booming in. Look here...they're really squeezing the stations in these days...KLZ on 1060 and KFAF on 1080...guess that leaves 1070 open for another Denver station! Think you know about KLZ being run by old "Doc" Reynolds but KFAF is run by Western Radio Corporation. Then, up here on 1180 is KFEL, the local Charleston-and-roll station...all the kids listen to them. Oh yes...listen to this one...romantic isn't it? This here on 1220 is one of my favorites, KFVR...The Moonlight Ranch Station."

"KFUP is this one on 1280...interesting to listen to them because it's operated by Fitzsimmons General Hospital...and right next to them here on 1300 is KFPO run by the Colorado National Guard...then, way up here at the top of my airphone dial is KFRI, a little weaker than the others because it's only 5 watts...also run by Reynolds Radio Company."

"We can't hear anything outside the state but it's fun to tune in between our locals here and try to get the University of Colorado station, KPAJ, at Boulder which I hear close to 1150 kc. They only have a hundred watts so they are heard pretty well for being 25 miles from here. The station operated by Colorado State Teachers College is a little tougher. Let's try it... here, they should be. Well, they must not be on now...tight schedule...but they are heard here with their 50 watts."

"Getting Colorado Springs is a little easier...let's tune down here to where the dial says 1200...there it is...KFXP, The Pikes Peak Broadcastin Company station...oh, but that's no sport. The real rough ones are KFKZ because we have a Denver station here on 1280, KFUP, and KFKZ's 25 watts is blocked. KFUM is tough but can be heard...let's try it. Ah! There it is on 1240 right where it should be. Nice signal for 100 watts, eh?"

"I've tried a dozen times for the Chronicle News station in Trinidad on 1070 but can't get it...it's only 10 watts but....see? There's no carrier there at all! The only other station in the state is at Gunnison and being operated by Western State College. No one can get KFHA on 1190 with 50 watts from here in Denver. I get slopover from KFXP on 1200 and besides, who can hear stations over the mountains during the day?"

"Clem, you better get one of these here new fangled airphones. There are a lot of interesting stations that can be heard at night here in Colorado. KDKA...KFI...its fun to stay up late and listen after some of the stations are off the air. There are hundreds of stations accross the USA that can be heard...besides, you probably have a good airphone location out there in the country anyway."

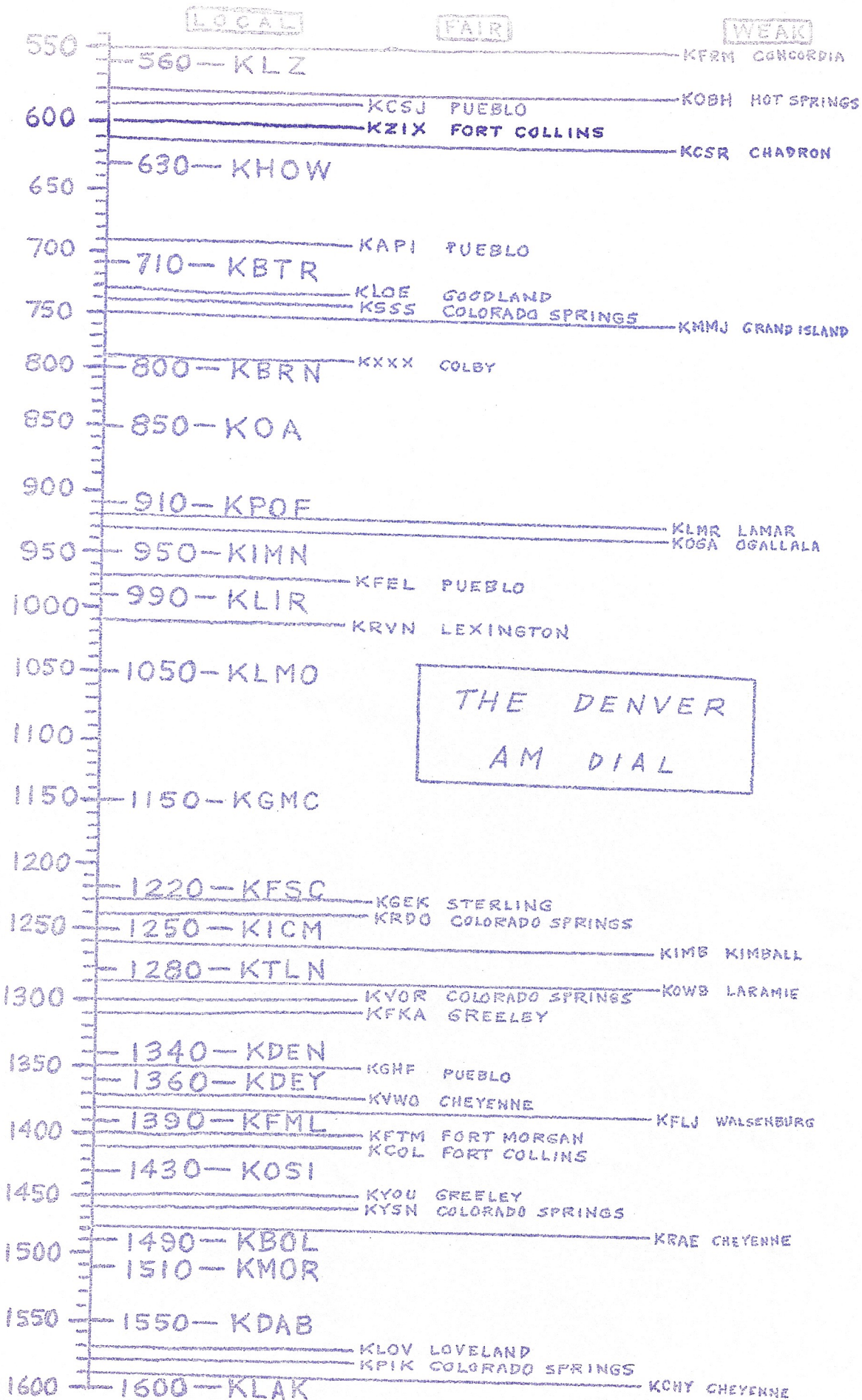

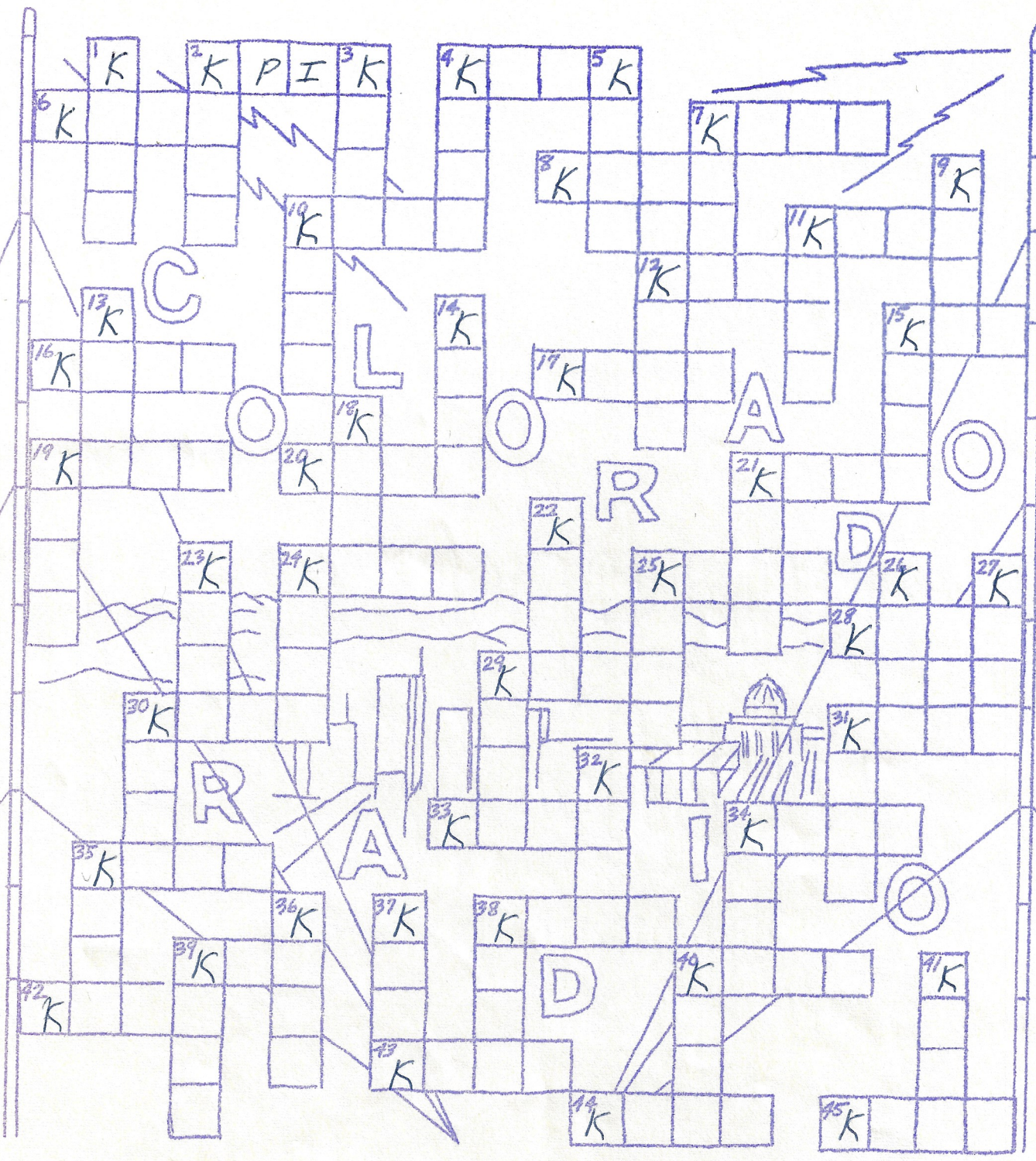

## COLORADO RADIO PUZZLE

This puzzle was not designed to be easy. We rather imagine that many people who are not too familiar with Colorado or Colorado radio stations will have a rough time finding the letters to put in each of the squares.

For those who may not be too familiar with the geography of the state, it is advisable to use a state road map before starting the puzzle.

A little hint for those who may not already know: since all radio stations in Colorado begin with a "K", put that letter in each box of the puzzle that has a number in it. There not, it can't be too difficult for you. Already you have over a fourth of the squares filled!

One other simple rule to follow: abusive language and teeth-gnashing may disqualify you while working this rather simple puzzle.

### ACROSS

- 2 country and western station near Pikes Peak
- 4 oldest continuous operation outside Denver - started with 10 w. at Yuma, Colorado
- 6 one of Denver's religious stations although still commercial
- 7 started out as a pop station - 5 kw. located in Denver suburb - call-letters express a state of comfort
- 8 1230 kc/s. - same call as a 50 kw. West Coast station with an "O" for fourth letter
- 10 an oldtime Pueblo station started by a newspaper and still bearing its initials in the radio call
- 11 one of two foreign-language stations in the state

- 20 only Denver station on a local channel
- 21 call-letters have something to do with frequency
- 24 pop music station near Garden of the Gods - call-letters spell something that lovers do
- 25 country and western and polka - in Denver Metropolitan area - used to be in Fort Lupton
- 28 1450 kc/s. - covers the San Luis Valley
- 29 1400 kc/s. - used to be KOKO a long time ago - in Arkansas River Valley - last three letters sound like a bumblebee
- 30 had two other frequencies of 990 and 1150 before settling on its present channel - 5 kw. in Convention Capital
- 31 only fulltime AM classical music station in the state - just recently went to 5 kw.
- 33 oldtime station near Cave of the Winds - call-letters have something to do with the mountains

- 34 5 kw. station on Western Slope in Colorado River Valley

- 38 located in one of the world's most famous ski areas - Independence Pass would lead you to it

- 25 old-timer in Pueblo on local channel
- 26 in 6-station market - calls itself "K-Jeff"
- 27 remove the "W" in the call and it leaves a 50 kw. station in Utah
- 29 located in famous Sweetheart City of America
- 30 oldest station in city named after famous presidential candidate in the late 1800's
- 31 1400 kc/s. - town same as fourth letter of Greek alphabet
- 32 near Royal Gorge - local channel
- 34 only 100 watt station in state - in famous resort area
- 35 name of town means "mountain view" in Spanish - local channel - take out a letter and have a 50 kw. station in Utah
