If I am not mistaking, I was already asked by one of your members (National Radio Club) to write a few words about CJVA Radio-Acadie. Being Atlantic's Canada newest French-speaking(language) radio station, CJVA has one of the largest daytime voverage in Eastern Canada. It is heard in at least five provinces (Québec, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, Newfoundland) and the French department of St-Pierre et Miquelon(off the coast of Newfoundland.) It is strategically located on the northeastern tip of New Brunswick between Baie des Chaleurs and Gulf of St-Laurent. Caraquet (and the Acadian Peninsula) is knowned for its French-Acadian culture, large fishing industry and is the cultural centre of this only bilingual Canadian province. Close to 40% of New Brunswickers are French-speaking, descendants of the first European settlers to Canada.
