Thanks a lot for the nice DX report. We are always glad to hear from any of our DX friends and I am always glad to verify reports. I have checked your report with our program log and with the announcer who was on duty at that time and am sure that it was WERH that you were listening to at that time. This letter will serve as your verification.

You asked about Hamilton. It is a small town of about three thousand population and was named after a colonel Hamilton who was one of the first settlers. I am not a native of Hamilton but I built WERH and have been here ever since with the exception of a few months that I was absent building WRHT in Griffin, Georgia. I like Hamilton and think it is one of the friendliest towns in the country.

We first went on the air in August 1950 and operated as a thousand watter until July 1953 when we increased our power to 5,000 watts. We are unidirectional and sign on every morning except Sunday at 4:00 AM and off at local sunset. We are independent and the only time we work with a network is during football season.

Thanks again for the very nice report and I sincerely hope you have the best of luck in all your work.
