Congratulations on picking up WSNB-610 kilohertz on September 21st, 1975 between 12:16 and 12:42 am E.D.S.T. I ran the equipment test with Ray Dulio, the DJ/Engineer working that night.

I received four reports from Stu Leland: Ray Arruda, Dr. Tom Williamson of Guelph, Ontario, Harry Hayes of Gouldsboro, Pennsylvania, and yours. Harry sent a one hour report which was astonishingly accurate even down to the music that I played.

Going over your report and checking my notes of the Test- at 12:16 the classical music you thought you heard here was band music "The Kaiser Jaeger March" a nice German tune. Your Morse Code ID times were right as well as the ascending tones. The piano selection at 12:26 was "The Pineapple Rag" by Scott Joplin and you heard "The Stars and Stripes Forever" at 12:40 am.

Like I said you did a great job hearing me and "SING RADIO." The off-beat music was from my own collection by the way. Stu Leland and I had made up a Cartridge Tape containing the Morse Code IDs and tones. He was pleased with the results of the Test and both times I ran it he wasn't there!

Schedule of WSNB is 0545(0700)-0000 and the frequency check is on the second Friday usually lasting two or three minutes sometime between 12:05 and 12:15 am EDT.

I ran the Test with the day pattern and day power of 1,000 watts. Weather at the XR site in Harwinton was broken clouds, ground fog, mist, and the temperature was 60 degrees. I didn't get home that morning 'til 2 am as the XR is a 40 minute drive from my house.

No more coverage maps are available at this time, that Xerox that I sent you last February is a copy of the one I have from a few years ago.

Once again, CONGRATULATIONS on hearing and verifying all of Connecticut! Glad I could be of help. I still need to hear 1400-WSTC Stamford and verify 1450-WNAB Bridgeport to complete the state. Perhaps, Chris Lucas will run an E/T for us.
