I am so very happy that you were able to hear WNWI on the TEST. If I wanted anyone to hear it in particular, it was you. By the times of the tones listed I can tell that it was definitely us that you heard. I note with interest that at 2:16 you mention ID given in voice. That was a station dingle which seemed to come in better than almost anything else, or else the signal peaked right at that period of time, because almost 100% of the reports have this in their loggings.

This letter is given as official verification of your reception of WNWI.

Perhaps you might be interested to know that we received 46 letters as of this typing from 20 states, 3 from Ontario and 1 from Rugg in Quebec. My most southern reception came from both Tampa, Florida, where we were noted in a car radio, and also from Houston's Dan Shoaf giving me a great log. To the west, it was a different affair tho, with Omaha being the farthest report. I was really happy to receive a letter from Chris Lucas in Fairfield, and also Ray Terlaga of Ansonia. Speaking of Ansonia, WADS is a station I'd really like to hear on a TEST. Also Westerly R.I., Stan Morse, Bob Karchevski and DaveSchmidt. Darn typewriter. Hi.

Our equipment is mostly RCA in the studios and transmitter with other makes of tape machines and modulation limiters. The antenna is a 310 foot vertical, guyed, non-directional tower with approximately 33,000 feet of buried #10 copper wire for a ground system.

I feel this was a well received TEST, with many favorable comments as to the clarity of IDs, tone, etc., and it is my distinct pleasure to have helped many NRCers, plus others log WNWI.
