
I take it that from your letterhead, you are the editor of the club magazine, of which someone sent us a copy.

Our transmitter is a Collins 300-J2 situated on a bluff overlooking the Big Blue River north of town, tower 185 ft, with 200 ft radials every 3 degrees and 35ft radials between the long ones. Don't know who put in the extra radials but it was very effective. We have two letters from New Zealand. And a couple of times we've beat Xerf to Amarillo, Texas when they were on the air. We've gotten letters from eastern Ontario and Massachusetts.

Thank you again for your letter. The voice was the Head of the House with his best Parade Ground Bellow. (During the Korean war he had once to address 40,000 troops when the P A system broke down.) Enclosed is a copy of our coverage map, but it can't very accurate. Our loyal listeners keep us up to 100 miles away in the daytime on car radios.
