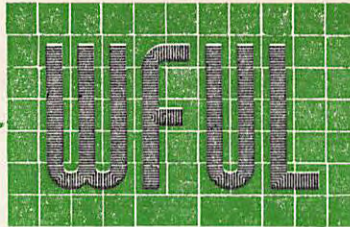

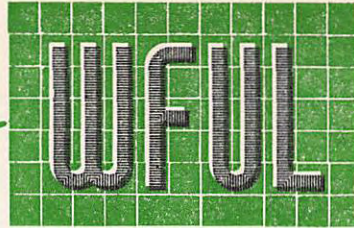
Dear Mr. Cooper,

Your report of reception of WFUL on February 12 is correct and ~~is~~ is therefore verified. Frequency checks are held the second Tuesday of every month from 1:35 until 1:45 AM CST. The monitoring station handling our frequency checks, is Van Nostrand of Atlanta, Ga.

WFUL went on the air officially August 1, 1951. We are a dawn to dusk station. I'm not sure how wide an area we serve on our regular schedule. Our signal doesn't go very far east, due to Kentucky Lake, and hills just to the east of us. However we seem to have a very strong signal otherwise. We have listeners as far away as Pine Bluff, Mo., which isn't bad for a 1kw station. Our antenna is non-directional.

Fulton was named after Robert Fulton, but just when the town was formed, I don't know. The population of Fulton is somewhere between, 6,000 and 8,000, if one can believe the population signs. Fulton is a junction point for the Illinois Central Railroad, and the railroad is the town's principal industry. Fultonians also pride themselves as being the smallest town in organized baseball.

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Congratulaions on your 19 years of DXing. It's quite an accomplishment to get 2,200 verifications. I've seen a lot of letters on National Radio Club Stationery, but I know almost nothing about the organization.
