Dear Mr. Cooper:

Thank you for your very detailed letter. I have the pleasure of verifying your reception report in every particular. It was indeed WNSR that you heard from 1610 to 1700 EST on 14 Feb. 1977.

The new call letters became effective on 1 February. As you correctly surmised, WNSR represents "North Shore Radio".

Our coverage maps are presently being reprinted. I will see that a copy is sent you when available. Although your area is not shown on our maps, it can be calculated that the field strength in Provincetown is 2 mv/m or better, due to ground-wave conductivity of sea water. In other words, you can experience signal strengths as good as those enjoyed by communities perhaps but a dozen miles from our ~~transmitter~~ transmitter, inland. Most of the Cape is within the outer contour shown on the map (0.5 mv/m), if that contour is extended as we have estimated. Even that level of signal is adequate for satisfactory reception in electrically quiet areas.

It is of considerable interest to receive a reception report as comprehensive as yours. Congratulations on your exceptional record of ECB DX'ing and, in fact, best wishes in all your radio endeavors.
