Dear Mr. Cooper:

Many thanks for your report of reception of our signal between 6:44 and 6:45 P.M., EST on April 5, 1948. Examination of our operating log allows us to verify your report of reception of our signal.

We are using a 1000 watt Collins 20T Transmitter on 1570 KC. A 212A-1 Collins Console is used in our control room with associated amplifiers. Our antenna is a 150 ft. triangular Truscon, self-supporting type. This antenna is too short for efficient operation at this particular frequency (due to CAA restrictions) which has resulted in a beautiful skywave, explaining some of our long distance reports of reception. New Zealand is our greatest distance reported. Three letters from there have been received.

We do at some time hope to have QSL cards made up and when they are received one will be sent to you.

Enclosed you will find the sign-on and sign-off schedule for our station.
