Gentlemen - Good Morning!

I've been trying to pick up WKIT here at the Tip of the Cape, and finally I have managed to do so. I hope you will be so kind as to verify my reception of WKIT, if you find my notes to be correct. Here is what I heard:

Date: Saturday morning, February 20, 1988 1200 kHz.

- 1:53 a.m. - KIT weather according to Lou McNally. Then the announcer said: "And now more of the best music from KIT, 100 FM."
- 2:01 - Singing station ID with the call letters sung twice.
- 2:20:30 - Weather again - snow changing to rain, from Lou McNally. Then said "It is now 31° at KIT-FM." Then rock oldies music.
- 2:26 - Song (Bob Dylan???) "Everybody's Gettin' Stoned." (Especially in the Gaza Strip, no?)

Date: Sunday morning, February 21, 1988.

- 1:34 a.m. - Mention of a program heard every Sunday night.
- 1:34:30 - Announcement about the Y.M.C.A., 941-2818, in Bangor. Then said, "More people are finding out about WKIT", then a singing, calls-only ID.
- 1:44 - Mentioned "The best music of yesterday and today ---- KIT-FM-100 - Check it out!"
- 1:50 - A.B.C. News with Joe Vaughn.
- 1:52 - A commercial giving the phone number 1-800-445-4400, something costing \$9.95 plus shipping, from 685 Bloomfield Avenue, Newark N.J.
- 1:53 - Lou McNally with the weather, now 33° and clear. "Ans now, more of the best music of the 50s, 60s and 70s on WKIT and WKIT-FM, Brewer, Bangor."

On Sunday morning, there was another 1200 station testing with cycle tones, which made no ID that I heard, along with interference on both days from WKOX, CFGO, and occasional bits of WOAI down in Texas, plus YVOZ in Caracas. Those latter two used to command 1200 in the days before the FCC opened it up to other stations.

The receiver is a Hammarlund HQ-180, and the antenna an indoor tuned ferrite rod, 14" long, on a spindle.

I am a volunteer deejay with WOMR-91.9 here in Provincetown; a community access non-commercial station, playing on Saturday mornings, an hour of concert band music, followed by an hour of all marches. I also am the Monday host of our daily "Lower Cape Concert Hall" from 1 to 5 p.m., and I do a 15 minute weekly interview show, "Community Profile." I am a retiree, from the banking industry, in New York City. I retired at the end of 1974, moved here "and lived happily ever after."
