Dear Mr. Cooper:

Reference your letter of April 2, 1952 which was turned over to me this morning by Mr. Armstrong to answer. I verify your reception of radio station WIAM on the Morning of April 2, 1952 between the hours of 2:35 am to 2:45 am as requested in your letter.

How Williamston was named I do not know nor does the secretary here at the station. The population is approximately 8,000 and is a very large farming center with tobacco being the main crop. Our frequency checks are held on the first Wednesday morning of each month normally between the hours of 2:15 am and 2:30 am.

Some of the DX reports that I receive are so vague that you cannot tell if the DXer received us or not and we will only answer ones that are correct without any doubt in our mind. You can depend on any reports from us being correct.

If you would like a DX program during the month of July immediately following the frequency check I will be glad to do so and will answer all good reports and I will make statements to that effect during the broadcast.

I would appreciate hearing from you if you will have time to publish this as lots of the fellows will be glad to hear from us. I know.
