Thanks again for the report and the enclosed NRC pamphlet.

I suppose the person you talked to was Mark Grady. He was manning the studio while the consulting engineer, Lew Parish did some testing at the transmitter. I was not there at the time. By the way, you heard the first transmissions ever from WJIK. I built the station myself but was on vacation at the time these tests were run.

As far as I know, you were the only caller; however, I have received a number of reports each time the station has operated during experimental hours. I have also received some for the period just prior to our CH sign off at 5KW.

WJIK will not be doing experimental hour frequency checks. I use a high accuracy counter for that purpose.

I am an informal DXer myself. I use the following receivers: R 390-A, R 388, BC 348Q and a Hallicrafters SX-100. I also have a Federal Radio TRF low frequency ^{PLUR} which goes down to about 14 Hz.

Provincetown looks like an excellent location for DXing. I also am close to salt water. I live within earshot of the Atlantic which is just across the barrier islands from my home down the peninsula about 7 miles S. of Wilmington, N.C.

Your looks like an excellent location for LOWFER activity (180-190 kHz). Have you gotten into that any? I would like to, but can't find the time.

You may have heard some of the other stations under my charge.

They are WHSL, WWIL, WPJC, WVBS, and WBIG. Former employment has been at WGN1, WAAV, WAGR, WJSK, WFGW and WMIT.
