Dear Ernest:

Received your very fine business report for our D-X program the morning of February 18.

We have checked our log in accordance with the times that you gave, and find that we are able to verify your reception. I do note that you logged our time on Mountain Standard Time. KBRL, however, operates on Central Standard Time, being on the edge of the time zone. For instance, all trains arrive in McCook on Central Standard Time and depart on Mountain Time. But the city and radio station operate on Central Standard Time.

McCook was named after Major General Alexander McDowell McCook, and, prior to being named after the General, it was known as Fairfield, Nebraska.

Enclosed herewith, you will find a coverage map showing KBRL's coverage by day to the .1 millivolt contour. KBRL took the air commercially September 26, 1947. We conduct our frequency measurement at 12:45 a.m. the second Thursday in each month with Kansas City.

We have set up the same time, 2:30-4:00 a.m., C.S.T., March 17, for another D-X program. This program will be conducted by Gil Mitchell, our Program Director. Incidentally, I, myself, conducted the last program.
