This will verify your last communication of October and also of August 23, 1951, in which you say that your radio set picked up KLMS early in the morning of October 15, 1950.

According to our log the program heard at that time was the Night Owl, a disc show heard every week from 12:00 midnight on Saturday until 2:00 a.m. Sunday, Central Standard Time.


KLMS night array is a very tight pattern with a lobe directed due north, the second lobe northwest, as our protection is to ward KANS at Witchita. Brooklyn would be almost in the center of one of our nulls. Our daytime pattern, is a simple cardioid beamed southwest with the null to Omaha.

Yes, our city was named after Abraham Lincoln and was founded in 1867. Its population, as described in 1950, is slightly more than 100,000. There are three radio stations in Lincoln including KLMS, which is strongest with its 1,000 watts. KLMS began broadcasting October 24, 1950. We are affiliated with Liberty Broadcasting System.
