Dear Sir:

We are pleased to verify your reception of our signals in Brooklyn on Sunday 11 November 1951.

Our test periods vary as to time, date and length of test period. We have an RCA 250 G transmitter Serial #BC 1782 installed in 1939. Our Antenna is a 313' vertical, set over a very damp area.

The City of Marinette was named after an old time Indian Princess, a Menominee Indian. The City of Menominee is named after the Indian word meaning "Wild Rice". The Population of Marinette is about 15,000 and Menominee is about 12,000.

In the matter of our listening coverage, our location is on the Menominee River about one mile from the Mouth of the River which empties into Green Bay. We may overshadow the coverage of a number of 250 watters by several miles during the daytime hours. We have had consistent daytime reports from 100 miles overland in a notherly direction, and up to 250 miles overwater as far away as the Soo locks. Have also had daytime reports from Milwaukee, Chicago and St. Joseph, Michigan. We have had one DX report from a NRC member in Pennsylvania, on a regularly scheduled program, on our 100 watt night time power.

The station does not have a regular test or other after sign off work.

Our schedule is 0600 CST to 2307 CST Monday through Saturday and the Sunday schedule is 0700 CST to 2307 CST.

This is our second report this week on our late test.
