Dear Ernest:

Please consider this letter as a verification of your reception of WCTY in Norwich, Connecticut on July 16, 1984. There QSL reports are not only interesting to receive, but helpful in maintaining a quality radio signal.

For your own info, WCTY operates with an effective radiated power of 3,000 watts with transmitting facilities off Cook Drive in the town of Montville--about five miles south of our studios in Norwich. We utilize a two-bay Jampro antenna atop a 170 foot guyed tower which puts us at 300 feet above average terrain. WCTY utilizes a Harris FM-5K Main transmitter with audio fed through an Orban Opti-mod 8100-A and sent from studio-to-transmitter via a Moseley STL link. Our auxillary Transmitter is a Collins 828-E-1 5KW with audio fed through an Orban Opti-mod 8000-A and sent from studio-to-transmitter via an auxillary Moseley STL link. Coupled with an emergency generator, this enables us to operate under nearly any condition.

WCTY began broadcasting in May of 1968 as WICH-FM with a beautiful music format until March 1974 when we switched to Modern Country. Call letters were changed in July 1975 to reinforce our country music identity. (By the way, WCTY too, carries the Music-Country Network six nights a week. We operate 24 hrs a day except from midnight to 5:30 A.M Mondays. You heard us during our maintainance period. Audio was being worked on at the time.) Again, thank you for your QSL report.
