Dear Mr. Cooper,

Thank-you so much for your letter of the first, informing the staff and management here at WRTC that you had received us way up on the tip of the Cape. We are always glad to here from our listeners, however far away they may be!!

In confirmation then, we were on the air on October 1, 1980, our programming was jazz so what you heard was most likely what we were broadcasting. The DJ was Eric Gaydosh and I am surprised by your statement that we didn't air any identifications during the two hours or so that you listened since he is one of our more conscientious staff members and knows the rules!! At six o'clock our daily programming switches, as you observed, to Spanish for one hour. Too bad you didn't stay tuned--at seven o'clock we broadcast what we call our Alien programming which consists of very progressive fusion-type rock/jazz/classical. It's all imported from Europe and we are one of the very few stations on the Eastern Seaboard that broadcast that type of music. It's quite an experience!!

On October 4, 1980, WRTC erected a new antenna. It replaces the twenty or so year old antenna that we used previously. The new one puts out not only vertical waves (as our old one did) but horizontal as well. Our power had not been increased but, as I understand it, our area is better covered. Perhaps the next time you are able to get us, you will have a stronger signal due to our newest acquisition.

Again, it was good to hear from you. If you are ever in the Hartford area be sure to stop by, say hello, and see WRTC.
