Dear Mr. Cooper;

We here at Patterson Broadcasters were surprised, to say the least, to receive your reception report dated 2/4/86. This letter will confirm your report. Since FM doesn't usually travel much beyond line-of-sight transmission, I must admit I was slightly skeptical about the DX reports' accuracy at first, but was convinced the moment I started to read the details of our programming.

At this point in time, we are in the process of having our coverage map made up and as such have only this enclosed diagram to illustrate our effective coverage area. Also, please find enclosed a couple of our winstickers, which are our major promotion this summer.

Our transmitter is an NEC FBN 9200E, with a power output of 20Kw. This gives us an effective ERP of 50Kw at the antenna. The transmitter is located on Geizer's (geezers) Hill just outside of Halifax which is about 600' above MSL. The antenna is on the 400' level of the tower.

CFRQ (Q104) went on-air on November 28, 1983 and operates 24 hours a day. Our format as you may have guessed is All-out Rock and about the only other station in Eastern Canada to have the same format would be CILQ (Q107) in Toronto, Ont. Jake Edwards is the morning personality at Q107 now, and Bob Powers is the Program Director/Morning Man here. Doug Caldwell is the Music Director.

Besides CFRQ-Q104, we operate CFDR, an easy-listening AM station with a carrier frequency of 680 KHz and a power output of 50Kw. (Nova Scotia's most powerful AM radio station).

On behalf of our entire staff at Patterson Broadcasters, I would like to thank you for your DX report, and wish you continued good luck in your DX-ing in the future.
