I remember writing a confirmation letter last summer, but since your letter was still in the "IN" box, I wasn't sure that I'd mailed it.

If I did indeed mail that letter then consider this an update of what's happening at WNYU. If not, then this letter is WNYU's verification of your DX.


The station's program logs confirm my own memory of that evening's broadcast, which was one of Andrew Kalish's first on-air shows. The PSAs and promotional announcements are all painfully familiar as we are still playing several of them.

Our programmin has changed substantially since last spring. We no longer carry any classical music, having switched over to New Wave rock, Jazz, Nostalgia and other specialty programming that is not available on the commercial stations in New York.

Our transmitter is an RCA BTF-5E1. We run 4200 watts into a directional antenna, with an ERP of 8.3 KW. The transmitter is remotely located in the Bronx on the old NYU University Heights campus. The co-ordinates are North latitude 40^o 51' 26"
West longitude 73^o 54' 48"

We share the frequency at 89.1 with WFDU, run by Farleigh Dickinson University in Teaneck, NJ.
