Dear Mr. Dabelstein:

Attached is our regular form letter for confirmation of reception of our station, but I thought I should personally express my appreciation for your report, in view of the fact that it is very astounding to say the least.

In the first place, at this time of the morning, 5:31 AM. EST., we are on night power, 1000 watts, and night pattern which is not at all favorable in your direction. I have checked with the announcer-operator on duty that day and he confirms the information you have listed in your report. My only thought might be that the station or stations normally offering interference to us may have been doing scheduled maintenance that morning and consequently were not on the air. Other than that, atmospherics must have been very unusual.

As you can see, our daytime power is 10,000 watts and our pattern is entirely different. I am enclosing a map of our section of southwestern Ontario, adjacent to Lake Huron, showing our daytime 0.5 MV/M contour, for your possible interest.

Our original station was founded in 1926 with a power of 10 watts, increased to 100 watts in 1933, to 1000 watts in 1942, to 2500 in 1959 and to 10,000 watts in 1967. We also operate Television Station CKNX-TV on Channel 8 with an ERP of 160 KW.

Thank you once again for your report, I have delayed in answering until now, as we have been suffering bad intermittent postal strikes here in Canada the past number of weeks and have endeavored to keep mailing to a minimum.
