Thank you for your letter and reception report of 11th January 1951.

You appear to have been listening to our transmissions on 1295 kc/s, which in the evening carries our European Service mainly intended for Germany. The morning transmission times are - 0500-0645, 0700-0730, 0800-0815 Greenwich Mean Time. The transmitter itself is located near Hull, Yorkshire and has an approximate aerial power of 150 kilowatts.

We are now approaching a phase in the sunspot cycle when propagation conditions are becoming suitable for long distance medium wave transmission during the hours of darkness. It is, therefore, likely that you will continue to receive 12050 kc/s occasionally for the next year or two.
