Dear Broadcast Listener:

Your letter reporting reception of signals from WAOG, on July 16,1946, has been checked and filed. It was found that your reception was authentic and therefore we are confirming same.

For your information, we receive signal reports from up your way quite often under normal conditions. This is most probably due to our antenna and ground system, not to mention our rather high broadcast frequency. Our equiptment consists of a 1940, R.C.A Model 250K transmitter. R.C.A Consolette, Frequency Nonitor and all Audio Equiptment. We have a Lingo vertical tower of 165 feet ( $\frac{1}{4}$  wave). Our ground system is buried under salt water.
