Received your letter of the 22 of this month, stating that you had picked up our station call and parts of programs on Sat. May 20 as well as the Monday show, May 22, which incidentally is my nite to howl. I am answering the letter because my people were residents of the fine city of Pittsburgh for around two years having left there last summer to take up residence in Pt. Lavaca Tex.

Am only too happy to be able to confirm your reception of C.K.Y., and the tunes and times which you stated verify the fact only too well. As you may well know Maurice Chevalier is not often used as a medium of entertainment any more and when I read your letter I could not help but recognize that it was my show which you caught. You may note however that on Sat. you had a different voice, due to the fact that our all nite man these days is a chap, by the name of Bill Moyer...formerly of Chicago. It may also interest you to know that we are only on all nite duty so long as the present flood conditions here exist. Usually our station is only air-borne 'til one o'clock Central Dailite saving time.

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It may also be of interest to you that we are soon going to change our frequency to 580 kilocycles rather than the 1080 to, which we are now assigned. Also may I extend my sympathies to you upon catching my show, I have been in the radio business for all of three weeks now and it still seems a bit awe inspiring and nerve wracking especially when a person is jocking his own show. I have an afternoon program directed at teen agers so that if the music you heard coming over on Monday morning was a bit on the Jazzy side... then my apologies.

Thank very much for your letter, and rest asured that I will be only to happy to advise asto when our change takes place. I suppose you will also take note of the fact that with a typewriter I am none too smooth either.
