

W K K E, 1080 kiloHertz;
Friday evening, December 4, 1992,
4:53 to 5:01 $\frac{1}{4}$ P.M., Eastern Standard Time:

4:53 to 4:56 P.M., Gospel song by a chorus of mixed voices.

4:56 to 5:00 P.M., Gospel song by a male vocalist and background chorus. One of the lines from the song was, "Don't forget happy birthday".

5:00 P.M., Instrumental music for 25 seconds, followed by the closing announcement from WKKE, Saint Pauls, North Carolina, at 5:00 $\frac{1}{2}$ P.M.

After giving the name of WKKE's owner, the announcer continued by saying:

"W K K E operates on a frequency of ten-eighty kiloHertz with a power of 5,000 watts as authorized by the Federal Communications Commission in Washington, D.C. Join us again tomorrow for another day of" (The signal faded during the last words of the announcement.)

The announcement was concluded at 5:01 $\frac{1}{4}$ P.M., and station WKKE left the air.

Please compare the above data with your programming on the evening of Friday, December 4th, and if my report is correct, kindly send me a reply confirming my reception of WKKE on 1080 kiloHertz. I would also like to know the power output of your transmitter at the time of my reception, if it is subject to critical hours restrictions. Your response to this request will be greatly appreciated.

Best wishes to you, sir, and to WKKE for continued success in broadcasting. I hope to enjoy further reception of your programs, particularly as the long winter nights provide for improved long-distance listening. I look forward to receiving your reply in confirmation of my reception of WKKE, for which I thank you. All good wishes for a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year!
