Thank you very much for your excellent report on the signal strength and quality of our new station, as logged on the Morning of July 24, 1950 at 2:31. We confirm your report.

The station here is brand new, uses a Gates BC-IF xmitter, Gates console, and General Radio Monitoring equipment. The transmitter and studios are located $\frac{1}{2}$ mile out of Smithfield. The transmitter feeds a 230 ohm open wire line 350 feet long and terminates in a 235 foet shunt fed Blaw-Knox self supporting tower. The ground system consists of 25,000 feet of $\frac{2}{78}$ and 10 wire buried 6 inches underground.

You certainly seen to have an excellent receiving setup and we wish you the best of luck with your avocation.
