Dear Mr. Geary:

We at the new WGHT! were pleased and exicted by your recent letter and are glad to confirm your reception of the station at 7:06 AM on September 14. Your comments regarding signal strength and audio quality are also appreciated.

I noted that you use a Hammarlund HQ-180 receiver for DX'ing. I use a similar (but not as sensitive) vintage Knight R-100A with a long wire antenna but have not received the station at my home in in southern New Jersey.

WGHT operates with an antenna input poer of 1080 watts into a three tower directional array. We are currently licensed for daytime operation only. We recently replaced the modulator and final tubes in the transmitter and increased modulation strength which probably explains your ability to receive the station at this time.

Thanks for your letter and your kind words. I hope we can continue to deliver a signal into your area and provide you with some pleasant DX time.

Thank you so much for your report of september 14, 1993. We transmit at 1 kilowatt during daylight hours only at 1500 kiloHertz. Until July 10th, this was WKER Radio also known as KERRADIO, and "The Mighty 1500", an adult contempoXXX rarary station. On July 10th, we became THE NEW WKER--oldies of the 50's thru the 70's only. We received authorization from the FCC to change our call letters to WW WGHT one month later(August 10th). Where came to life in Fall 1964, and had stayed X under the same management for nearly 29 years. It was time to make some changes, so when Mariana Broadcasting, Inc. bought the station in July, new personnel wewere added, the format was changed, and general improvements will continue as time goes on. Your report of September 14th was accurate, and we appreciate your detail, and the time you took to

keep us informed. The bumper sticker and postcard are but tokens of our appreciation.
