Dear Mr. Geary:

This will confirm your reception of State Police station WPHE on 1634 kilocycles during the early morning of October 20, 1943, as demonstrated by the log you submitted.

The music you heard did come from the radio dispatcher's office. As you may know, practically all radio stations must monitor a key broadcast station for signals relating to possible air raids. Consequently, the broadcast receiver here is sometimes maintained at a level high enough to be heard distinctly over the air.

We are pleased to hear about the high quality and strength of our signal. It might interest you to know that all the transmitting equipment at our fixed stations was constructed by our own men. All the stations you heard have a power of 1,000 watts.

I regret the delay in answering your letter. It was shown to the operating staff and they were somewhat surprised to learn that some one so far away was listening to them. Most are or were radio amateurs and it is not unlikely you will hear them on the air after the war.
