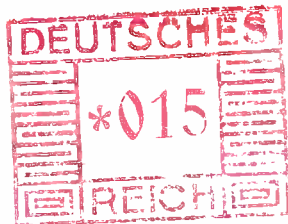
We would also appreciate if you would invite your friends to listen in to our program.

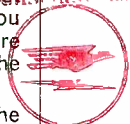
