Dear Sir:

Here is another report on my reception of CBJ on 1580 Kcs. I have made such reports before, requesting your verification card, but have received no answer, possibly they were lost or mislaid, so here is a new one, which I hope you will acknowledge and verify with your regular card.

I realize that it is impossible to give a real proof of reception on CBJ, since all programs that I have heard were chain features, transmitted by others as well as CBJ, however I see no other way to report your station, specially so since I do not understand French.

My location is 7 miles NE of Buffalo, N.Y. and CBJ is often heard here, on nights when radio is good, I have interference from a Mexican station, but on poor nights, or in early evening, CBJ is heard very clearly, and often with good strenght, strong enough to overcome all static and local noise, in daytime I have trouble with a syntbthic signal from nearby WKBW on 1520 Kcs. and cannot hear you then either.

CBJ has a very good signal, excellent tone quality, very good modulation and a very steady, clear carrier.

Here is the program data, for prooff of reception. Date, monday, Jan. 24, 1944. Time 9:15 to 10:00 P.M., Eastern War Time.

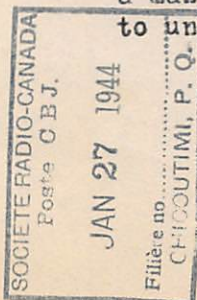
9:15 to 9:30, an all french program, featuring what seemed to be a radio act or drama, talking by men and women, with short periods of violin music at times. At 9:28, in the finel announcement, Princeton, New Jersey, was mentioned, then at 9:29 the 'Radio Canada' and your own announcer saying 'CBJ, Chicoutimi'.

At 9:30 CBC presented a new series of programs featuring a pianist and contralto soloist. some of their numbers were, 9:31, A sonata, on piano. 9:36, a ballet, by the contralto, about Blue Eyes. Then the 'Hindo Song' by a composer who has had considerable success with lighter french music. 9:45, Prelude #24, by Shupan. Piano. 9:49, "Winter Roses" by contralto, then 'Whats The Use of Dreaming' piano. These were announced in French and english. At 10:00, the usual Radio Canada, and CBJ, Chicoutimi announcement. Your own announcer just says 'CBJ, Chicoutimi', he is a man, and has a very French voice, as near as I can tell, at least he is harder to understand then the French announcers at the chain program.

Thanking you in advance for a reply, and enclosing reply postage, I am.
