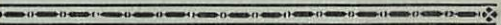

TUINUCÚ.—CUBA

This station began experimental work using 50 watts in Septiembre of the Year 1922.

In March 1923 the power was increased to 100 watts and broadcast its inaugural program March 9th 1923.

Within ten days after one week's program had been transmitted, every state in the U. S. A. had reported reception of the programs as well as ten different countries including Canada, Mexico, the Bahamas, Bermuda, Honduras, San Salvador, Costa Rica, Panama, Colombia, South America, Haiti, Santo Domingo and Porto Rico.

Record long distance reception of 6KW concerts are from Endakó, British Columbia, Canada, a distance of 3500 miles from Tuinucú and St. Johns, New Foundland, 2,500 miles away using 100 watts.

Boats in the Pacific, in the Gulf of Mexico, Atlantic Ocean and Caribbean Sea and various U. S. Government Warships have reported reception.

Enthusiastic and sometimes touching letters have been received from cripples and other shut-ins and sick persons to whom the concerts broadcast by 6KW have proved a welcome boon in their lives.

When you hear the cuckoo-coo, it's station 6—K—W.

The cuckoo lives on Bacardi and some how that appeals to me.
And when feeling dry, I wish that I, were cuckoo just like he.

How we'd like to see your flowers, all your birds we'd like to see.
And the joy of your tobacco, would be joy enough for me.
So of Tuinucú in Cuba, we are very glad to tell.
Of the thrill that came by radio, as we heard your station well.

Many joys the radio brings us, many hours pass quickly by.
Many thrills as distant stations, seem to answer “Here am I”.
As when Tuinucú in Cuba, while we listened in one day.
Seemed a voice that stood besides us, thought' was many miles away.

'Tis the homeland of the cuckoo, down in sunny Tuinucú.
How we'd like to take an airship, fly down and call on you.
We can't always hear the cuckoo, can't always hear him talk,
There 's no cuckoo here in the U. S. A., save the cuckoo in the clock.

When you hear the cuckoo coo you will think your cuckoo too.
Don't be alarmed, it means that you've tuned in Tuinucú.
And when you hear their jazz band play, you'll listen in till break of day,
When once you've heard that cuckoo bird, you just cant break away.

Feeling kind of tired and disheartened sort of blue?
Just listen and I'll tell you how to cure it, what to do.
Get out your pipe and light it, and blow smoke rings in the air.
Then start your radio going and “Tune in Tuinucú”.

Do you know what you will hear then? Why its Cuba-Tuinucú.
Station 6-K-W Cuba are you sure you heard that right?
And then almost beside you comes a cuckoo call most clear.
You grip your chair, begin to grin. Oh boy! you want to cheer.

You wish that you might be there on the isle at Tuinucú.
