Thank you for your letter of May 19 th. reporting reception of this station on May 17th.


We are always glad to receive reports on the reception of our transmitter and this will serve to verify yours. I am sorry that reception was not better but of course it is easy to see the reason why. Possibly at some future date it may be more enjoyable. At night our directional system beams south and is suppressed in your direction affording protection to WAKR and WBRV's coverage.

Our transmitter and part of our studios are located  $2\frac{1}{2}$  miles north of Albany on route 19. We also have studios in the Albany theatre building. We have been on the air since May 28, 1941 and have the most modern of equipment. The transmitter is a Collins 20-K and the speech and associated equipment is also of Collins manufacture. We use two 225 ft. vertical antennae.

Albany is a city of approximately 30,000 population located in the southern part of the state, 70 miles from the Florida boundary line in the heart of the pecan orchard country. Albany is known as the pecan center of the world. It is a typically southern city and one of the finest of it's size in the state.
