Dear Sir;

Am happy to confirm your reception of our station during test broadcast for frequency measurement on January fourth. Am surprized you was able to log us at all under the adverse conditions.

the station identification given was "W J A Z " William Jig Able Zebra in Albany Ga. and the tone was one thousand cycles at eighty to eighty-five percent modulation.

It is not intended that such tests be ran regularly by W J A Z as it is hoped that in the future our frequency measurements can be made during our regular broadcast day.

W J A Z uses a Gates 250 c-1 transmitter, using two type 810 tubes for power amplifiers and two more 810's for plate (high level) modulation. the antenna consists of a single tower (non directional) 230 feet high, with the ground elevation here being 205 feet above sea level, the ground is part red clay and part sandy loam with a conductivity of 4×10^{-14} E.M.U.

The terrain around Albany consists largely of rolling foothills , with farming, cattle raising, pecans, lumber milling and naval stores being principal occupations and products of the area, Albany itself is a rapidly growing modern city of approximately 33,000 and has two other radio stations, W A L B & W G P C.

I enjoyed your letter and am sorry for the long delay in replying. you might be interested to know that one other listner also heard our tests on jan.4. He is Mr. Watson Wendt, of Hill City, Minnesota.
