
Thanks for your kind letter of Nov. 21st. This will verify your reception of KLIC, Tuesday Nov. 21st, between 4:18 to 4:30 AM, CST. I understand that several stations operating 24 hours on 1230 kcs are located near New York State.

For your information KLIC operates daily from 5:45 AM CST to 1:00 AM CST, and on Sundays from 6:00 AM to Midnight CST. We have had several reports of being received between midnight and 1:00 AM from New York State.

We are using a Collins 300G transmitter; and a ground system consisting of 240 radials each 200' long with the outer ends bonded to a circumference of heavy copper wire. The tower is a brute of a thing 190' high. The transmitter location is swampy and in a sunken spot. Strange as it may seem our signal is much stronger in and around Monroe than the two 5kws now operating here. One operates on 1390 & the other on 1440 kcs.

Again many thanks and I hope that when you again tune in KLIC you can give us another report. I am a dentist 45 years of age, practicing dentistry for over 22 years, and I was the first applicant for a radio station in Monroe and that was way back in 1928. Since then I made other applications and trips to Washington etc. And finally the FCC did make this grant. It has been a tough fight with many disappointments, heart aches and more tough fights. I am very well pleased with my operation and rendering a wonderful public service.
