Dear Sir:

Your letter of the 20th came today and we are happy to acknowledge the very fine reception report you sent us. I am an assistant engineer with WSLs and am authorized by the chief engineer, Mr. Al Heiser, to answer all DX mail received by us.

The description of the aerial you use and the kind of receiver were interesting to me as I have a Super-Defiant Hallicrafter and do some DXing myself although I usually fish for C.W. stations as I have a code speed of 45 words per minute and have copied Transradio press at various broadcasting stations where I have worked. We do not have any QSL cards right now but I hope this letter will satisfactorily confirm your report.

We occasionally transmit test transmissions after the station has signed off for the day after midnight and if you are a late DXer you might try fishing for us then. However, these transmissions have no fixed schedule and so you will have to just listen and hope to hear us. WSLs operates on a frequency of 1500 Kc. with a power of 250 watts and unlimited time. Our daily schedule is from 6 am till midnight on week days and from 9 am till midnight on Sundays.
