We are pleased to verify your reception of Station K.T.U.P., Tooele, Utah, during our transmitter check on the morning of November 18th, 1957, from 2:00-2:30, MST. Your comments concerning reception, your receiving rig, etc., were appreciated.

In case you are interested, our transmitter is a 1-KW Collins 20-v, with non-directional antenna. The transmitter is operated with a dust remote-control unit from our studios, some 9 blocks from the transmitter and tower. KTUT is a day-time station, of course; this month our operating hours are 7:15 a.m. to 5:15 p.m., MST.

P.S. The static which you mentioned in your letter was very bad throughout most of the area east of the Rocky Mountains, especially. We did get a number of reception reports, but had almost as many negative reports from that area. West, it was a different story. One DX-er just outside of Seattle sent us a tape he made of the broadcast; not a trace of static; it was actually air-worthy; (that is, we could have broadcast it locally again, with little loss of quality). We had very "loud and clear" reception as far northwest as Powell River, British Columbia, Canada, coming in on many DX-er receivers better than the local stations. We'll probably hold another similar program early in 1958, and hope for better atmospheric conditions over eastern part of the country this time. Thanks for writing.
