The naive art of the Dalecarlian painters flourished in a geographical isolation which has long been broken down. that every Swede is X-rayed against tuberculosis,

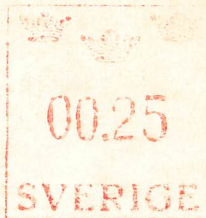
that the founder of the Nobel Prize, Alfred Nobel, was a Swede,

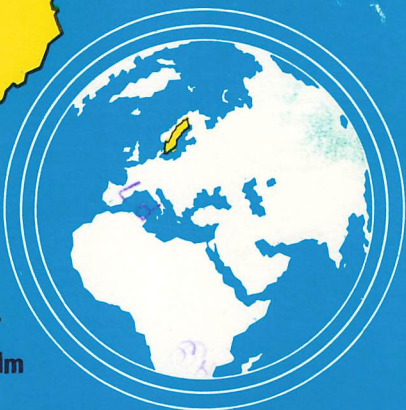

"THIS IS RADIO SWEDEN"

The listener who hears that call somewhere on the short-wave band is listening to a transmission from Scandinavia's largest overseas broadcasting station.

Radio Sweden sends programmes daily in English, French, German, Spanish, Portuguese and Swedish. Short-wave transmissions are beamed towards many parts of the globe. At present there are seven beaming directions and the broadcasts can be heard every night all over the world. Each beamed transmission lasts between 1 and 1½ hours and includes always a Swedish and an English-language programme. Non-beamed short-wave transmissions and a midnight broadcast on the medium-waves are to be heard in Europe.

A listener to Radio Sweden receives the latest news from Sweden and Scandinavia, together with Swedish press comment on international affairs. Other programmes, features, etc., mirror daily life and developments in Sweden and seek to acquaint the listener with the music of the North.

Our aim is to present an objective view of Swedish life and culture, in an entertaining manner. The programmes are produced in Stockholm by a group of foreign reporters employed by the Swedish Broadcasting Corporation, which enjoys a monopoly of broadcasting and TV in Sweden.

Radio Sweden's two 100 kW transmitters are located at Hörby, in the plains of South Sweden.

Radio Sweden also produces programmes about Swedish life for the transcription service, which places them at the disposal of foreign radio stations.

Our mail department is always happy to get letters and reception reports from listeners overseas, acknowledging them with Radio Sweden's QSL card and fuller replies, where necessary.

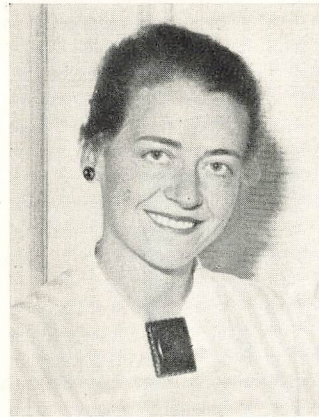
