Dear Sir,

Thank you for your letter and reception report dated 6TH Nov, 1972 .
This is to confirm your reception of G.B.S. transmissions on 560 KHZ,
on the 6.11.72 between 08.35 - 08.50 G.M.T.

The Guyana Broadcasting Service is an independent Guyanese organisation forming the nucleus of a National public service broadcasting system for the future, and has no connection with any other broadcasting organisation based in Guyana.

The Service provides one programme in English, which is carried by all transmitters. Programme hours are from 0500 to 0100 Guyana Time, on Wednesdays, Fridays, and Saturdays. On remaining days of the week, close down is at midnight Guyana Time; Guyana Time is G.M.T. minus $3\frac{3}{4}$ hours.

The Service is at present operating on 560 KHZ, with a maximum power output of 20 KW in the M.W. Band; on 5.95 MHZ in the H.F. Band between the hours of 0900 - 1600 daily; and at all other times on 3.29 MHZ. Power output on short wave is 10 KW, driving Vertical Incidence aerial arrays having a gain of approximately 3 dbs.

The Service on short wave is intended for listeners, in the interior of Guyana, not served by our M.W. transmitter on 560 KHZ.

There is a VHF F.M. service, for the Greater Georgetown area, on a frequency of 102 MHZ, with a transmitter aerial combination giving an ERP of 100 watts.

Our transmitters are located at Sparendam on the Atlantic Coast approximately six miles East of Georgetown.
