
Report of reception of this station by you September 15th, 1945 is acknowledged.

This report is most gratifying. You might be interested to know that WKWF was on the air from 9:30 P.M. Eastern War Time September 14th to 10:45 P.M. Eastern War Time September 15th on an emergency basis only. This station was not ready to go on the air at that time but because of the hurricane emergency authority was requested to go on the air on a temporary basis, inasmuch as there is no U. S. Radio station giving primary service in this area. At the time of our broadcast we did not have our radio ground system installed, or did we use our quarter wave blow-knox insulated self-supporting tower. Our chief engineer states that our signal should be 200% better when we get on the air permanently and our ground and antenna are placed in use. During the emergency we used a #6 wire running north and south about 75 feet long for our antenna and a long piece of copper wire wrapped ^{around} in a copper rod driven in the ground several feet.

WKWF expects to be on the air around the 10th of October. A report of reception from you at your convenience after we get on the air permanently well be most appreciated. This station plans to operate 18 hours per day from 6 A.M. to midnight every day except Sunday and Sunday from 7 A.M. to midnight.
