We ran equipment checks for several evenings early in the month. Your log check of Nov. 9, from 4:05 to 4:28 $\frac{1}{2}$ A.M. EST checks with our log of that date.

We went on a regular commercial schedule at 5:45 A.M., Nov. 13, 1954.


We are using Collins equipment, throughout, with a stainless 200 foot guyed tower with a ground system of 120 hard drawn copper wire radials 200 feet long, located 2.4 miles outside the City Limits of Warner Robins, Georgia, and we have found that our signal is reaching out far beyond our expectations.

We have had letters from all over the south and southeast, and even some from New York and Pennsylvania, and believe me, we really appreciate each one.

Once again, Mr. Morss, may I say that we were very happy to hear from you and receive your detailed log of our Nov. 9 broadcast. Thank you, also, for do kindly enclosing a postage stamp for our convenience in answering your letter.
