Dear Stan:

Thank you very much for your reception report of WNWI for our test broadcast on November 6, 1966. Your log agrees with programming in several instances, especially the fact that you heard the code ID two times. I especially put that in for that purpose for those close to WTIC.

This letter is given as official verification of our reception of WNWI.

You might be interested to know that I have received 46 reports from 20 states, 3 from Ontario and one from Quebec. The farthest east report appears to be from the Boston area, farthest southeast is Tampa, Florida, southwest is Houston, Texas, of which I am very happy. CX to the west did not seem to be very good, as Omaha, Nebraska was the most distant report from that region.

Our equipment is mostly RCA in the studios and transmitter with other makes of tape machines and modulation limiters. The antenna is a 310 foot vertical, guyed, nondirectional tower with approximately 33,000 feet of buried #10 copper wire for a ground system.

I cannot find Bradford on the map. Perhaps you could mention the location in your musing.

It was a real ball being on the air at that time and getting the phone calls from distant points. I am very glad to have been able to help the DX cause somewhat by the addition of our station to so many DXers. I am looking forward to the WCST TEST coming up MM. They will be a hard one to crack, what with CFRB.
