Thank you very much for your report of our special broadcast for the National Radio Club. According to our records, we can verify your report on Sunday, Jan. 15, 1956, at 4:30 to 5:00.

W P L M is a daytime Station, with sign-on Monday through Saturday at 6:00 AM, and Sunday, at 8:00 AM. Our sign-off is at local sunset. W P L M operates with a power of 500 watts, through a Gates BC-500 GY Transmitter. In fact, WPLM is equipped with Gates throughout. Our tower is approx. 300 feet above sea level, and is located North lat. 41° 56' 37" and West lat. 70° 42' 06". W P L M has frequency checks taken once a month, usually on the second day of the month, during regular program hours. Equipment checks always occur at midnight on the night of the test, otherwise, there is no set schedule.

W P L M is located in one of America's outstanding tourist spots. Plymouth was the home of the early settlers, and the point at which the Mayflower finished its long journey from England to the New World. The world famous "PLYMOUTH ROCK" is located in Plymouth at the point of the landing of the pilgrims and only a few blocks from the WPLM Studios. Many of the original buildings of the Pilgrims have been preserved, and are open to tourists in the summer months. Also, there are numerous monuments all over the Plymouth area dedicated to the early settlers and the most outstanding, is The Monument of the Forefathers, the largest all granite statue in the world.

In addition, Plymouth is the gateway to the vacation wonderland of Cape Cod. The summer months find thousands of people from all over the United States comming to the Cape Cod area for fun and recreation in the warm sun and fresh ocean breezes.

It is a pleasure to add your name to our list of WPLM listeners, no matter how far you are from Plymouth. You have heard the voice of AMERICA'S HOME TOWN...Plymouth, Massachusetts.

Once again, thank you for your time and trouble in reporting.
