

Dear Mr. Morss:

We are very happy to verify your reception of our station during our annual DX broadcast of December 9-10, 1951. Many thanks for your excellent report.

We received many interesting reports as a result of these tests, including a recording made in New Zealand by National Radio Club members.

Our transmitter is a Western Electric 442-A-1. We were using our authorized power of 500 watts at the time of your reception. We have a Blaw-Knox self-supported antenna, 205 feet high. The transmitter site overlooks the beautiful Allegheny river from atop Bunker Hill, two miles south of Kittanning.

As you may have heard during the broadcast, the name of this city is derived from the Delaware Indian words meaning "a place at the great river".

The management of our station was extremely pleased with the numerous long distance telephone reports received during these broadcasts.
