Thank you for your report of our signal reception in Mancos, Colorado!

After reviewing your letter, the programming mentioned is programming that KMXE carries. KMXE is the flagship station for the Radiovisa Network. Originated from our studios in Sherman Oaks, California, Radiovisa reaches approximately 60 markets in the US with news and information from the US aimed at Hispanics living in the US.

More information regarding our station and the network can be found online at www.la830.com.

The programming you mention in your letter was verified with our program logs for accuracy as to day, date and time as broadcast on 830 KHz, KMXE, Orange, California.

KMXE operates at 50KW non directional day and 20KW directional at night using three towers. Our transmitter is located near the intersection of the 91 and 71 freeways in Corona, California. We operate a Harris DX-50 transmitter with phasing and tuning hardware built by Phasetek. The facility is approximately 5 years old at this time. KMXE is also one of the first Southern California AM radio stations to broadcast with the new HD Radio technology developed by iBiquity Corporation. While the HD Radio is allowed for daytime use only at this time, KMXE has chosen to be one of the first to implement it. (More info can be found at www.ibiquity.com.)
