
It is a pleasure to confirm your reception of KOKO Radio on 1450 KHz. during our test broadcast of Monday morning, January 21, 1974. We were operating with 1,000 watts during the experimental period.

We were very well pleased with the test results, as we got 23 reports from 12 states plus Manitoba. The most distant were about 1,000 miles away; from David Thomas in Tampa, Fla., Tom Sundstrom in Willingboro, N.J., Kermit Geary in Walnutport, Pa., and Daryl Belanger in Swan River, Manitoba. The first three copied only CW IDs, but Daryl sent a nice tape with very surprising audio. Illinois was tops with five reporters and Nebraska was second with four. Wish you had still been in Colorado, though, as we didn't get any from west of you at all. Other states besides those mentioned included: Indiana, Ohio, Minnesota, Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana, and Missouri.

As best I can tell, you were the second most distant reporter using a longwire. Geary was using a 200 footer. Most were employing loops or Space Magnets it seems. Hammarlunds are certainly the dominant receivers in BCB DXing, as more than half of our reporters were using HQs.

Are you still with NRC, Bill? If so, hope you will send a report from time to time on what you're hearing up there. Best of DX to you and thanks for the report.
