
Dear Mr. Nittler:

This letter will serve to confirm your reception of KALE on November 23, 1959. The broadcast you heard was part of the normal Monday morning routine maintenance schedule carried out by myself. KALE operates 24 hours dailey, closing down at 10:00PM Sunday night and resumeing broadcasting Monday morning at 6:00AM.

KALE is an independent operation, running the usual format of Music, News and Sports. Transmitter power is 1000 watts with a directional antenna system that concentrates the major lobe of pattern in a North-Westerly direction. At the time of your reception of KALE, the daytime tower was in use.

Glad to hear from you and hope this letter serves the purpose.
