Dear Mr. Sampson:

This letter will confirm your reception of radio station KKAR on $1290~\mathrm{kHz}$, $10:51\mathrm{PM}-11:07\mathrm{PM}$ CST, January 4, 1994. Your reception report agrees with our broadcast log for that period.

KKAR broadcasts news, sports, and talk programming around the clock from our studios in downtown Omaha. Our transmitter site is located just south of the Omaha city limits. KKAR broadcasts with a power of five kilowatts day and night. Our signal is omnidirectional in the daytime, and during the night is directional using a three-tower array, with most of the signal directed to the north and south.

Until August of last year, KKAR programming was heard on 1180 kHz. Our company purchased the license and transmitter site of Omaha station KOIL on 1290 kHz, and KKAR programming was moved to the new frequency. The KOIL callsign was transferred to the 1180 kHz frequency, which we are now programming with an "adult standards" music format. We also have an FM station, KQKQ on 98.5 MHz. All of this certainly makes for a busy broadcast day and lots of work.

Thank you for your reception report. We are always happy to receive reports and I try to reply to them in a timely manner, although recent projects have left me with less time to write replies. We received many reports since our frequency "swap", including two from Finland, and I am slowly getting around to sending responses.

Again, thanks for the report, and good luck with DXing.
