Dear Mr. Sampson:

This letter will confirm your reception of radio station KOIL on 1180 kHz, 4:33PM-4:58PM. Your report details agree with our broadcast log for that period.

KOIL broadcasts an "adult standards" music format, concentrating on music from the 1940s thru the 1960s. Our studio is located in downtown Omaha, and the transmitter site is located just east of Council Bluffs, Iowa. KOIL broadcasts with a daytime power of five kilowatts using a two-tower directional array. Night power is one kilowatt using a four-tower array. The signal is directed mostly to the southwest to cover our city of license, Bellevue, Nebraska. The transmitter is a Harris SX5A solid state unit.

The KOIL callsign has been in use in Omaha since about 1925, according to my records. Last August, our company purchased the transmitter site and frequency of KOIL, then on 1290 kHz. We moved our radio station KKAR, formerly on 1180 kHz, to 1290. The KOIL callsign was transferred to 1180 kHz, and the current music format was put on the air. Recently we installed C-Quam AM stereo equipment to make the music sound even better.

Thanks for your reception report. We have received lots of reports from a variety of locations for our station(s) on 1180 kHz, as far away as California, Montana, Pennsylvania, and Texas. I try to reply to all in a timely manner, but recent projects have taken up quite a bit of my time.

Again, thanks for your letter, and good luck with DXing.
