Dear Sir

Thank you very much for your report of KFGT. I am pleased to verify your reception of station KFGT in Fremont, Nebr., from 9:38 A. M. and 9:48 A. M. (CST) on July 30, 1955. Your report is correct in every detail.

KFGT has been on the air for many years, beginning with the call-letters of KORN. In March of 1949, KFGT's call-letters were changed to the present ones, as the Fremont Guide and Tribune station, a local newspaper here - hence the last three letters "F-G-T". KORN had originally operated on a frequency of 1400 kcs, but in 1949, that frequency was given to a new station in Lincoln, Nebraska. So KFGT came on 1340 kcs. with a power of 100 watts. KFGT is on the air from 6 A. M. to 10P. M. (CST) and 6 A. M. to 6 P. M. CST on Sundays. We have no scheduled frequency check; the frequency is measured during the daytime hours by KOIL in Omaha.

Our station utilizes a Collins 300A transmitter running a power of 100 watts. Only 100 watts is authorized because of the proximity of stations in Estherville, Iowa and Kearney, Nebraska on the same frequency. The antenna is a uniform cross-section, guyed, veryical radiator 182 feet high and is located a mile and a half north-east of the center of Fremont, just east of highway #275.

Again, we at KFGT want to thank you very much for your interesting report from Omaha. Let us hear from you again sometime, won't you? Best of DX.
